CELEBRATING COMMUNITY CAREGIVERS

At our annual fundraiser, Making A Way with Peaslee, we had the honor of presenting our Community Changemaker Award to the Collaborate and Care Crew of Rothenberg Preparatory Academy. This group of inspiring women banded together in the midst of a global pandemic to ensure their students' needs were met during remote learning. They went above and beyond for their students, providing them with school supplies, clothing, meals and more. It was a privilege to partner with them.

We also took this moment to lift up two amazing caretakers in Peaslee's building community: Marilynn Anderson, an early childhood educator at Peaslee for over 20 years, and Peaslee's Master of Custodial Arts Larry Fogle, who has cared for the center for over 10 years. Marilynn and Larry were honored with Changemaker Awards for their dedication to caring for children and community space. Peaslee appreciates all the love, energy and wisdom they bring to countless families and our community.

SOCIAL JUSTICE EDUCATION



Despite COVID limitations on our work with school groups, we continued to deliver powerful community content to roughly 390 people through adaptive means. We designed safe ways to offer community journey walking tours and affordable housing simulations to close partners, and our in-depth coursework with Community Mentors and Miami University remains strong.

We have made great strides in developing The Movement card game, created by our Agents of Change. With new prototypes, connections, and game design insights, we are underway with late-stage testing and tweaks. The excitement and potential of this teaching tool continues to grow as we near a final product.

EDUCATION-BASED ORGANIZING

Our Equitable Development Rubric spurred increased attention and action city-wide as Peaslee delivered presentations to two City Council committees, with support from public testimonials at City Hall by a wide array of Cincinnatians across neighborhoods. Our work on transparency in public development incentives forged new coalition connections and factored heavily into November's city election results, setting the stage for new possibilities. Our staff also played a significant role in elevating the case for a fully funded Affordable Housing Trust Fund.

Meanwhile, our support for equitable development at the ground level continued through collaboration with community councils. We published our *Rubric Guidebook for Community Councils* followed by a training series that engaged representatives from 10 community councils.





PEASLEE KIDS SUMMER CAMP

In 2021, an outdoor classroom in Peaslee's front yard was home base for our Peaslee Kids summer camp, a safe and supportive space for learning, positive youth development, and fun for kids ages 6-9 from Over-the-Rhine and surrounding neighborhoods.

Peaslee Kids participated weekly in swimming and gardening, and enjoyed local field trips as well as visits from guest artists. Teachers also read books with students and led discussions about different aspects of social justice.

At the end of the program, campers presented their writing and other learnings at a public showcase for their families.

RISERS

In the interest of COVID safety, Peaslee's summer camp groups were smaller in 2021, so we shifted the ages served by each group and created a new program, Risers, for ages 10-12.

Through journaling, art appreciation, and group discussion, the inaugural class of Risers worked on developing a deeper sense of self, building confidence, and practicing empathy. Campers enjoyed adventuring through Over-the-Rhine to show each other their favorite places. They visited two local art galleries celebrating the work of Black artists, and interacted with lots of cool animals at Camp Joy!

Thanks to our neighbor <u>Gallery at Gumbo</u> for welcoming our Risers to appreciate local artists' work.



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WRITING CIRCLES

The Girls Writing Circles returned to school buildings to continue providing a safe space for young ladies to express themselves and appreciate their individual gifts. This year, our youth writing partnership grew to include two summer programs, at Rothenberg Preparatory Academy and Pleasant Ridge Montessori. In weekly circles, Peaslee educators and 3rd to 6th grade girls focused on affirming their sense of self, supporting their creativity, and fostering their unique voice.

AGENTS OF CHANGE

We were excited to welcome our Agents of Change youth back to Peaslee's building for inperson programming beginning in the summer of 2021. All of our students felt that we talked about important things during camp. Most participants cited climate change as a topic they were interested in and would like to learn more about.

PIANO

Our piano program served 17 students throughout 2021. In the spring and summer, our music instructors provided individual piano instruction virtually with students as they practiced and progressed at home with online flashcards, laptops, music stands, keyboards and music books from Peaslee's lending libraries. In the fall our students returned to in person instruction at Peaslee with Sr. Terry Thorman. In a bittersweet transition, Rebecca Smithorn, Peaslee's Piano Coordinator left Peaslee to pursue her orchestral career. We wish her the very best!

COMMUNITY FOOD PROJECT

Peaslee continued working in partnership with the Cincinnati Interfaith Workers Center and the Freestore Foodbank to distribute shelfstable groceries in our neighborhood. When community members asked for more fresh fruits and vegetables, Peaslee began hosting monthly Produce Pop-Ups in our parking lot and provided nearly 350 households with fresh produce!






