PARTNERSHIPS AND SOLIDARITY

For more than 34 years, Peaslee has maintained and improved a collective, accessible space for people to gather and work for positive change in our communities, city, region and nation. Complementing Peaslee's programs and community projects, seven non-profit partners housed in the Peaslee building are also working to build a more just world through education, advocacy and organizing. Together, we work in solidarity to amplify our impact in the community.

PIANO /

In 2018, our four-level Piano Certificate Program served students ages 5-65 in spring and fall, including 9 first time piano students. More than 200 people heard students play in recitals and other community programs throughout the year.

A partnership with the CSO provided the opportunity for more than 300 Peaslee community members, including piano students and their families, to attend Lollipops family concerts at Taft Theater. In addition, 55 students and family members attended family engagement events hosted by Peaslee.

WRITING

Throughout the school year Peaslee facilitated weekly Girls Writing Circles with students in grades 4-6 at Rothenberg Preparatory Academy. In each circle, girls read inspirational texts, then wrote their own creative responses and shared their writing

with the group. At the end of each semester, the girls read their writing aloud at a community showcase. They also released a collection of their work and published individual work in Streetvibes newspaper.

The Justice Seekers Women's Writing Circle continued offering women a space to reflect on poetry, follow their muse and affirm the voices of sister writers.

Over-the-Rhine Community Writing Collaborative is an initiative connecting Peaslee and other community-based writing programs. In 2018, a steering committee worked to compile *This Place of Ours*, a forthcoming book of original writing by community members. Peaslee also hosted writing workshops in the fall semester through a service learning project with Miami and Northern Kentucky Universities.

COMMUNITY EDUCATION

Service Learning

In 2018, Peaslee continued to facilitate Community Journeys, Affordable Housing Simulations and Urban Plunge activities for groups visiting Over-the-Rhine to serve and learn about social justice issues in the community. Twenty percent of Community Education participants were connected to Peaslee through deep, ongoing partnerships, learning from the stories, wisdom and insight of local residents.

COMMUNITY BUILDING AND ORGANIZING

Keep Our Courts: Do Development Differently Campaign This ongoing coalition of residents and community-based organizations worked to protect and invest in public space while prioritizing community voice and benefits. Two hundred community stakeholders were engaged through surveys and door-to-door canvassing. We also connected with approximately 150 community members by organizing events, including a Community Clean-Up, Summer Kickoff and Community Campfire.

Equitable Development Rubric

In 2018, Peaslee created an educational/organizing toolkit to evaluate development projects and attach equity standards to public incentives like zoning changes and tax abatements. A steering committee of 16, representing nine neighborhoods, was formed to train and support local leadership around the rubric. By the end of the year, three community councils were examining ways to implement and/or endorse the toolkit as a framework for equitable development at the City level.

AGENTS OF CHANGE

This was the fourth year of our Agents of Change program, which serves youth between the ages of 11 and 15 from Over-the-Rhine and other urban core neighborhoods. The number of participants in our school-year program doubled from 2017 to 2018. Throughout the year, youth learned about issues of social justice, engaged in critical thinking, and creatively exercised their voices. They continued developing and testing their cooperative card game, *The Movement*. For the second summer, Agents in their final year worked as mentors with children in the Peaslee Kids Summer Camp through paid internships, building job experience while contributing to the positive development of younger children.







PEASLEE KIDS SUMMER CAMP



Our Peaslee Kids Summer Camp provided a safe, supportive space for learning, positive youth development, and fun for children ages 6-10 from Over-the-Rhine and other urban core neighborhoods.

The curriculum included identity and culture, leadership, art, reading, and small group discussions. The camp was implemented by caring, experienced teachers with assistance from Miami University student fellows. Regular field trips extended kids' learning and their experiences into the community.

The children also participated weekly in Gardening, Cooking, and African Drumming classes. Peaslee Kids showcased their learnings by leading the Samba Parade with their drumming instructor, Baba Charles Miller, at the Macy's Kids Festival at the Cincinnati Zoo, and at a public showcase at Peaslee with their families and community members.






