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Piano Program

In 2016, our Piano Program supported 50 students ages 5-65, with 7 first time piano students. Eight students received Level One certificates and two students received Level Two certificates. We also expanded our offerings by adding a summer program which retained 80% of students from the spring while assisting with retention of musical skills into the fall semester.

Students participated in recitals and performances throughout the year that were attended by more than 225 people. Additionally this year Peaslee Piano

Writing Programs

Through a variety of writing programs, we celebrated the self-determination of community as realized through a collection of voices too often shut out of traditional platforms of written word publication.

One of Peaslee's writing circles, **Justice Seekers Writing for Our Lives** continued its quarterly gatherings, offering a pause to take in poetry, to follow one's muse and to affirm the voices of sister writers.

Our **Girls' Writing Circles** for 4th, 5th & 6th graders continued in 2016 through a partnership with Rothenberg Preparatory Academy. Each meeting, the girls find and develop their voices, read poetry, write creatively and share their work, verbally affirming one another. At the end of the fall semester, The Girls' Writing Circle held a holiday showcase of their work at Rothenberg where they displayed and read their writing aloud.

This year, the **Over-the-Rhine Community Writing Collaborative**—an initiative connecting Northern Kentucky University, Peaslee and other community-based writing programs—began work to create and publish an original book of collected community writings. This first book project is part of an exploratory process aimed at the potential creation of our own independent community press.

In 2016, our Community Education Program engaged 2,238 individuals—more than double our participants in 2015.

Service Learning & Visiting Groups

Over 900 individuals came to us in groups visiting Over-the-Rhine to learn about social justice issues in the community. Twenty percent (20%) of these visitors were involved in deep, ongoing partnerships directly connecting them to the stories, wisdom, and insight of local residents. Participants explored topics including gentrification, racism, community teaching, women as activists, democracy, and power and privilege.

Neighborhood Residents & General Public

Other Community Education work more directly engaged neighborhood residents, other urban core families, and general community stakeholders. In 2016 approximately 1,330 people engaged with this education, dialogue and advocacy work.

Our **Agents of Change** program, involving local youth ages 11 – 15, continued to delve into the intersection of self-expression and social change. Their major group projects included the design of a motivational

window banner graphic, the makeover of a functional soap box for public speaking, an original mural paying tribute to Peaslee history, and a written manifesto of shared beliefs.

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Ongoing coalition work included organizing, educating, advocating and developing leadership with the **Keep Our Courts: Do Development Differently Coalition**, which works to protect and invest in public spaces with priority placed on community voice and benefit.

In 2016, this coalition was successful in getting the City of Cincinnati to table a plan to replace

a recreational space and community garden with luxury homes. The Cincinnati Recreation Commission then announced a plan for a community input process concerning all the spaces they steward in Over-the-Rhine, including this contested space at Main & Schiller.

Our public education events on community development opened our doors for citizens to dialogue and learn about the quality of life and economic disparities in our communities. Small group sessions with Over-the-Rhine residents and stakeholders led to deeper discussions of equitable development tools and their application in Cincinnati. We began work in coalition with other partners

3 to influence city-wide development policy around affordability and access.





Partnerships and Community Events

Caregiver Circle Project

In 2016, the Caregiver Circle Project, a partnership with the Center for Community Change, impacted over 500 participants as we connected with community allies like SEIU, a union for care workers, Cincinnati Interfaith Workers'



Center, The Contact Center and other local organizations and individuals. Our organizer, Pat Youngblood, continued to invite people with caregiving experience into community change efforts to support and recognize their work. This year, six (6) circles were held at churches, schools and residences in Over-the-Rhine and an on-going Women's Support Group helped women in community share their skills and connections. A Caregiver Summit also tied together local and national events, skills and connections of caregivers.

Black Lives Matter Cincinnati

Throughout 2016 Peaslee partnered with Black Lives Matter Cincinnati (BLMC) on education, community outreach and actions to stand up and speak out against racist and exclusionary practices in our community. BLMC hosted an amazing basketball tournament in support of our neighborhood youth and families and the Keep Our Courts: Do Development Differently Coalition that was attended by over 100 people in support of public recreational space. Peaslee also joined the Countdown to Conviction Coalition to educate and organize for justice and accountability in the case of Sam DuBose.



Community Events

In addition to the specific program work already highlighted, Peaslee co-hosted community events throughout the year that engaged approximately 950 people. Our space is growing as a hub for education, organizing and social change.


